#### Information about:


- The People's Story (in the former Canongate Tolbooth) is a museum about the lives of ordinary people, their occupations and trades, housing and lifestyles, from the 18<sup>th</sup> century to the present.
- The Museum of Edinburgh is Edinburgh's local history museum, housed in the 16<sup>th</sup> century Huntly House.
- **Dunbar's Close** is a recently restored town garden open to the public. If weather permits, it is a quiet spot to enjoy a packed lunch.
- Canongate Kirk was built 1688-91 with a Dutch-gable style. The Kirkyard has some notable occupants eg. Adam Smith, David Rizzio, Robert Fergusson and 'Clarinda'.

**DIRECTIONS** (minimising hill climbing!)

- BY RAIL: From Waverley Station upper level, exit to Market Street, and turn left. At junction with Jeffrey Street fork right, and continue to High Street; then turn right. The Storytelling Centre is beside John Knox's House.
- BY BUS: From St Andrew Square Bus Station, turn left along the Square & St David's St to Princes Street; turn left into Princes St and cross at next lights. Turn right into North Bridge, then continue to the High Street and turn left.
- BY CAR: Parking is limited and expensive. East Market Street has several on-street places, limited to 4 hours (£2 per hour); Jeffrey Street has a handful. Waverley Station Car Park in New Street is the closest with 24 hour parking (eg 6 hours for £8.50). There is also parking at Dynamic Earth in Holyrood Road & Holyrood Park.

# Celebrating Sir John Sinclair's contribution to Local History

Sir John Sinclair (1754-1835) is well known to most local historians for his work in promoting and editing the Old Statistical Accounts. But Sir John's 'zest for information' involved him in many other pursuits which contribute to local history and are less well known.

This year is the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his death and the Scottish Local History Forum is marking the occasion with this conference which highlights some of Sir John's achievements. David Affleck 'tops and tails' the day with an introduction to Sir John's life and work, and concludes with an assessment of his legacy. Heather Holmes gives an account of the reports compiled for the Board of Agriculture, an invaluable, but less well known, source for local historians in the UK, while Helen Chisholm focuses on the Statistical Accounts website.

In afternoon the location changes to the Canongate Kirk, where Sir John was an enthusiastic participant. Graeme Cruickshank completes the day with highlights from the history of the Canongate.

I reflect on the great moral lesson to be learnt from Sir John Sinclair's admirable life. I consider whether during the many years in which he flourished, there was any man whom I could fix upon as having laboured with the same assiduity and with the same success for the benefit of mankind.
