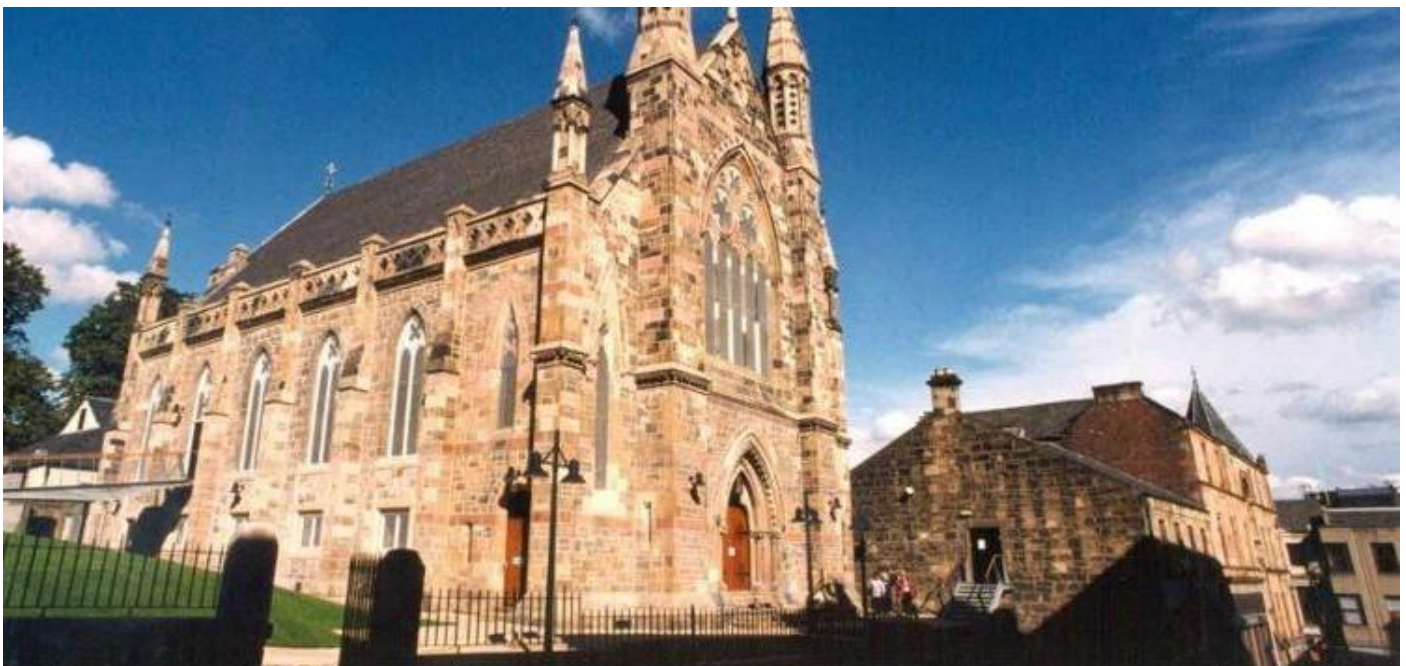

LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES AND MUSEUMS

■ **Inspiring the Nation: 300 years of Libraries in Scotland** On the 100th anniversary of the National Library of Scotland Act, **Historic Environment Scotland** explores the history of libraries in Scotland and how they have developed from private book collections to vital spaces at the heart of our communities. Charting their innovation and growth from the 17th century through their continued evolution in response to the changing needs of society to become the varied public services they are today. The exhibition runs at **Edinburgh Central Library** on selected dates until Saturday 20 September 2025. Meanwhile across the road on George IV Bridge the **National Library of Scotland** in its 100th year is holding the exhibition **Dear Library** which champions the vital role that libraries play in Scotland. ■ The **National Library of Scotland** has made some changes relating to accessing material in its reading rooms. Up until now, material published before 1850 was consulted in the Special Collections Reading Room on level 15, and material published after that date was consulted in the General Reading Room on level 13. From Monday 4 August, if you wish to consult material published before 1925, you will have to view it in the Special Collections Reading Room. By re-categorising these items as 'special collections', this means NLS staff can better advise you on handling and supports. This also helps staff to ensure the collections' longevity, long into the future. On 7 August 1925, the National Library of Scotland was created by an Act of Parliament. This makes its new rule easy to remember – if what you seek is older than NLS you will have to consult it in the Special Collections Reading Room. Catalogue records for all affected material (i.e. anything published between 1850 and 1925) have been updated in the NLS system. So, when you reserve your material on its website before your visit, everything will be handled for you as usual.

■ A recent search of the **NLS** catalogue surprisingly indicated that there was an incomplete run of *Scottish Local History* held there. Further enquiries have confirmed that issues 1-121 are in the NLS and the misleading catalogue record will be fixed in due course. In the meantime, the easiest way to see and order the earlier issues is to click on pressmark HP.la.120 SER (the first of the three listed for the journal), and then click on the 'Description all' dropdown menu. You will then see a list of all the issues (1-121), although even this is a little confusing, as the list starts from 49 - 121, and then 1-48 appear below.

■ A new guide to finding placenames has been produced by **NLS Map Library**. This resource gathers together some of the main lists of placenames or gazetteers on its maps website. These allow you to search and locate names or written text on maps. [Placenames - Map images - National Library of Scotland](#)

■ Issue 47 of *Cairt: the newsletter of the Scottish Maps Forum* was published in July. This issue carried a brief article on a recent NLS acquisition of a pincushion map of Scotland. The issue also featured an article by Nevis Hulme on Timothy Pont's map of Wester Ross. The author's detailed local knowledge of this area has allowed further suggestions on the identification of mountains and their presentation, as well as suggesting Pont's possible route through them. A second article, by Diana Webster and Douglas Lockhart, charted the bumpy career of Andrew Henderson (c.1791-c.1862) – farmer, stock breeder, cattle dealer, land-surveyor, valuator, author of 'Practical hints on the principles of surveying and valuing estates' – and serial bankrupt. ■ **Salver Saved** The special exhibition this year at **Cupar Museum** is a celebration of the 250th anniversary of **Cupar Curling Club**. The club provided much of the display material, but Cupar Heritage also sourced artefacts from the Scottish Curling Trust including an engraved copy of the painting by Cupar-born artist Charles Lees of the 'Grand Match' played on Linlithgow Loch in 1847. Selections of photographs, trophies, map of curling places, stories of matches and displays of badges make up the bulk of the display. Notable club members are also highlighted including one-time Scottish and British Ladies Champion Jenny Graham and her husband Met Graham, who also played internationally. They presented trophies to the club including a handsome silver salver as an inter-club trophy, but there was a problem: when the exhibition was being set up the club revealed that the salver had been missing for many years. Cupar Heritage saw that as part of the history so put the facts on display, while optimistically appealing for help to find the lost trophy. About two months after the start of the museum season a visitor arrived holding a large black bin bag from which, like a magician pulling a rabbit from a hat, he produced the missing salver – word had got around, the appeal had worked! In common with some other trophies the salver was originally awarded for something else, in this case 'for the best five acres of swedes in Fife and Stirling' by Webb & Sons (Stourbridge) Ltd. Mr Alex Graham won the trophy in 1916, so when the Graham family handed it over to Cupar Curling Club in 1981 they were actually re-presenting it as the Met Graham Challenge Salver. Its re-emergence thus adds to the local history of both the farming industry and the sport of curling. After a bit of rearranging of exhibits and some judicious re-captioning the salver has gone on display. Its highly reflective surface makes it difficult to photograph – best just to come and see it at Cupar Museum.

MEET A TRUSTEE

Dr Phil Back



Originally from Brighton, Phil graduated in modern history at Stirling University in 1974 and spent ten years working in commerce in Scotland and in Puerto Rico before discovering in 1985 that research was his real métier. Since then he has worked in research in the voluntary and not-for-profit sector, moving into local authority work in 1999, and ultimately running his own successful research business from 2006 to 2016, working on projects for councils across the UK, and won two national awards. He has also spoken at major regional and national conferences and worked in a voluntary capacity for the BBC and other bodies.

Alongside his work, Phil returned to learning with adult education courses that led on to a Diploma in Transport Studies from the University of York in 2001, and an Advanced Diploma in Historic Environment from the University of Cambridge in 2003. He retired in 2016 to complete a doctorate at Sheffield University with a thesis exploring the origins of Scotland's country parks, but was then tempted back to work with Imperial College London for a three-year EU-funded research project working with municipal authorities in the UK, Belgium, the Netherlands and France on greening the city. He is at last now fully retired.

He has published several academic papers, including work on a neglected landscape architect named Elisabeth Beazley, a study of Culzean Country Park, and a paper examining the role of the National Trust for Scotland in country park creation. He has written *for Scottish Local History*, with articles on Chatelherault Country Park, near Hamilton, and Pollok Country Park in Glasgow, and his doctoral thesis has been published in book form. His most recent article, on the rise and decline of a Scottish tourist destination, is expected to be published later this year. Phil has also contributed several book reviews on Scottish and international subjects to a variety of publications.

His current research focusses on the history of the small community of Rumbling Bridge, which is more interesting than might be supposed, but he remains interested in country parks and has been invited to speak at the SLHF conference on the protests at Pollok connected with the M77 extension, and to present his Chatelherault research in Hamilton later in the year. He has been a Trustee of SLHF since August 2024 and has worked primarily on a strategy for promoting the Forum's work and increasing our membership.

Although he now lives in York, Phil maintains close links with Scotland, and visits regularly for research, for holidays, and to follow the variable fortunes of Ayr United FC. He enjoys reading, music and sport, and is proud to have visited every current Scottish league football ground. He is married (to a Scot) and they have three adult children and three grandchildren.
