
## SLHF is on Substack!

## LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES AND MUSEUMS

■ The latest issue of the Scottish Maps Forum's **Cairt** newsletter was published in January 2026. This featured two larger research articles, the first by Peter Drummond, looking at mountain names on William Roy's Military Survey of the Highlands, and the significant changes to these names over the next century. A second article, by Douglas Lockhart, described the interesting life of David Walker (1793-1844) of Wester Fintray and Aberdeen, one of North-East Scotland's most prolific land-surveyors. This issue also looked at map events taking place in February and March, and recent NLS map website additions. *Cairt* is available at <https://maps.nls.uk/cairt/cairt48.pdf>

■ Online *maps.nls.uk* addition: OS maps published in 1975. The earliest website addition in 2026 was 9,851 maps at scales of 1:1,250 to 1:10,560 which were published in 1975, and which have therefore just come out-of-copyright from 1 January 2026. This includes a significant number of Scottish maps, which are often the earliest detailed post-War coverage of these places.

■ The **Scottish Council on Archives** has been working on its national project, *Made in Scotland – Business Archives Connecting with Communities*.

This initiative explores how business archives are being used across Scotland to:

- Connect with communities
- Support local identity and placemaking
- Contribute to sustainability and net zero goals
- Inspire creativity and innovation within organisations

SCA now has six case studies from business archives, both current and historic, that exemplify these points.

■ **Discovery of 12th century Coin** The earliest known coin to be minted in Scotland almost 900 years ago has been acquired for the nation after it was found by a metal detectorist. The medieval David I silver coin, discovered in a wooded area near Penicuik, Midlothian in 2023, has been dated to the second half of the 1130s. ■ SLHF members who attended the 2016 conference *Safe as Houses: Scotland's defensive buildings through time* may remember a fascinating talk by Grant More about the work which was being done by volunteers to restore a Cold War bunker in Corstorphine Hill. Originally part of Second World War air defences it was then planned to be the central emergency hub for the Scottish Office, should UK government break down in the event of nuclear war. After decades of neglect and vandalism, a new owner in 2011 aimed to restore it as a visitor centre. Although restoration is still continues, '**Barnton Bunker**' is now available for visits - book at <https://www.barntonbunker.com/> and read about the history of the Bunker at <https://www.barntonbunker.com/barnton-bunker-history>.



- As referenced in recent editions of *Clish-Clash* we have been waiting for news as to the successor to Melvyn Bragg in the programme **In Our Time**. [Misha Glenn](#)y became the presenter from the middle of January. He's a very experienced radio journalist so we are confident whilst being different it will retain its excellent reputation. It's well worth catching his recent interview in the Radio Times.
- **The History Podcast** offers a wide selection of material. It's mainly got an international flavour including the arrest of Pinochet, [Shadow War: China and the West](#) which looks at points of friction in recent times. A very powerful series called [D-Day: The Last Voices](#) and very many more including the Lucan Obsession and the Brighton Bomb. - [From Our Own Correspondent](#) has recently celebrated its 70th anniversary with a special programme in the Radio4 Archive slot. Anna Foster presented the programme with some of the BBC-known foreign correspondents. First broadcast on 25 September 1955 and has reported from almost every country in the world.
- [Apollo 1: Destination Moon](#) was screened on Channel 4 and is the story of three astronauts who were part of America's original quest to reach the moon in the 1960s. The events that occurred shook the world and left a lasting impact on all space flights ever since.
- [Upon a White Horse](#) Stretching from midwinter at Stonehenge to midsummer at the Sycamore Gap, journalist Peter Ross takes up the long human story as he visits the ancient places of the British Isles. From stones to shrines, through ritual and commemoration, what are we seeking when we connect with the past? This includes a visit to Unst where we witness the Up Helly Aa Festival.

- **Witness History** on the BBC World Service continues to offer great material. One of the recent highlights was part of a toy themed show [The Creation of Jenga](#) which featured an interview with the game's British designer Leslie Scott. Also, an [episode](#) about when Laurel and Hardy spent Christmas at an English Pub is a joyful listen!



- In a similar vein a recent discovery is [Sporting Witness](#) which is an absolute treasure trove of archival material including the stories of Eric Lidell and Rose Reilly a former footballer who played as a striker from the early 1960s.
- A new series of [Lady Killers with Lucy Worsley](#) includes the story of the murder of a Glasgow servant Jessie McPherson and the debatable conviction of her good friend Jessie McLachlan. She was sentenced to life imprisonment and served 15 years behind bars.
- [Written in Scotland](#) was a radio series first broadcast in 2021 where over 4 episodes Kirsty Wark explored the relationship that some of Scotland's writers have with the country itself.
- [Lockerbie: Our Story](#) was a documentary in which families and relatives of six victims gave their very personal and painful perspectives.

- [Titanic Sinks Tonight](#) The Titanic's final 160 minutes above sea are relived in real time for this sombre but fascinating four-part series. Actors read from first-hand testimonies, letters, memoirs and telegrams to show the stories of survivors, while experts offer insight into what the voyage meant, especially for the second and third classes searching for a new life. It starts on the evening of 14 April, when ice warnings came through as the passengers partied or slept.
- **Radical with Amol Rajan** is always a good listen and the historian [Tom Holland](#) takes us on a journey to explore the history of radical ideas.
- [Culloden](#) is Peter Watkin's acclaimed docudrama from 1964 that reconstructs the 1746 Battle of Culloden. It was made as a mock TV war report. There's a follow up programme called The Making of **Culloden** introduced by Kirsty Wark—at the time of writing not available on iPlayer but hopefully that will change.
- [Digging for Britain, Series 13](#) A welcome return to our screens of **Digging for Britain**. The first episode of the new series includes a visit to Glencoe where relics from the 1692 massacre have been unearthed. A visit of a site at a Glasgow skatepark shows that recent history can be just as relevant and fascinating. A later episode includes a visit to a hill top fort in [Fife](#).
- **Britain's Favourite Railway Stations** is presented by Si King on Channel 4 and can be found on the channel's streaming system. Described by the Radio Times as being 'just the ticket'!
- [This Week in History](#) offers fascinating, surprising and eye-catching stories from the past including the 1903 announcement of a bike race called The Tour de France. Plenty fitted into a 5-minute chunk.



- [JLB : the Man Who Saw the Future](#) was recently broadcast on BBC Four 4 as it is almost 100 years since John Logie Baird demonstrated technology that would come to revolutionise leisure time across the planet. BBC Four aired two documentaries, the first featuring testimony from his son Malcolm with the JLB title and then a documentary from 1976 [The Birth of Television](#) in which Leslie Mitchell traces the origins of TV to the first outside broadcast in May 1937.

- [An American Journey](#) Presented by James Naughtie this Radio 4 series traverses the United States to examine how the inalienable rights of 'life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness' still bind the nation today. Rather interesting timing!
- [Archive on 4: Forged in Steel](#) offers a variety of voices up and down the country about the demise of a major industry. It includes a visit to Ravenscraig.
- Recently launched [STV Radio](#) so far doesn't feature anything history related but might be worth watching out for.
- [Flog It](#) is a very popular programme on the BBC. Not in the same league as Antiques Roadshow but they often visit some interesting places and find some intriguing items to sell. An easy 30-minute watch in these wintry afternoons.
