SLHF NEWS

Collaboration is the theme of this year for SLHF, with events planned together with organisations from around the country.

- The next *Walk & Talk* is organised by Graham and Linda Clark of the **North Kessock and District Local History Society**. Graham is an SLHF Trustee and Linda is on the SLHF Advisory Committee. This will be held on **Thursday 12 May** in **Inverness**, with the theme of Old Inverness. Timings will fit in with public transport from the central belt.
- Another *Walk & Talk* is being arranged with Helen Williams of the **Scottish Printing Archival Trust**, for a walking tour in **Edinburgh** relating to the history of the printing trade. This will probably be in mid-June.

Full details of both these *Walk & Talk* events will be available in March.

• The National Library of Scotland is wishing to enhance its interests in local history by including occasional local history themed talks in its events programme, and adding as much local material as possible to the national collections.
