■ *In recent articles I have struggled to suggest Scottish Podcasts and suddenly one appears! **Witch-Hunt** is a BBC Radio Scotland Programme and Podcast which started on 31 October. It's a six-part radio and podcast series which traces the stories behind a very strange period in Scotland's history. A stellar cast of commentators join Louise Yeoman and Susan Morrison. Six good chunky episodes very deftly make connections between those times and the here and now which makes it all a wee bit troubling*

■ **BBC Sounds** has replaced the BBC Radio Player and I am told has been a struggle for those without smart phones or tablets so I hope you can find it. You can add bookmarks and subscribe to certain programmes—all a bit fiddly to start with but well worth the effort. A couple of my highlights are below—a bit idiosyncratic perhaps but it just shows the extent of what's available.

■ My Podcast of the year is **Junior Historians** which is an excellent BBC Scotland series where pupils from schools around Scotland delve into their local history and produce their own radio documentary. First off the blocks was Dunrossness Primary School from Shetland who produced a 28 minute programme about the Braer Oil Disaster which occurred in January 1993. No caution shown by these young Primary 7 interviewers who were able to handle the brief and ask meaningful questions of people who had lived the experience. Next up is the Dens Road Primary 7 class from Dundee who will tell us about the demise of the Keiller's Marmalade and Confectionary factory—I can't wait!
