• Eddie Stewart of Clackmannanshire Field Studies Society writes:

"Our Society is just about to begin a four year project under the auspices of the Inner Forth Landscape Initiative, and funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. Our project is called "**A Tale of Two Estates**", concerning two local families, the Mars of Alloa and the Bruces of Clackmannan.

It deals with: the 17th century stone harbour; 17th & 18th century lade systems which carried water to power Egyptian wheels, which drained the coal pits; 18th century waggon-ways for the Alloa and the Clackmannan Estates, that carried coal to the local harbours and carried limestone from the harbour back up to the Devon Iron works."

Stirling Council is running a fun, innovative family history themed day on Sept 13 as part of the Stirling 2014 activities to celebrate the City and its history. As part of this event, we are offering local and family history societies the chance to have a stand in our display area.

Held in Stirling's Tolbooth in the historic 'Top of the Town' area, 'Wha's Like Us?' will exploit the unique history of the building to explore topics such as crime and punishment and how people lived and worked in the local area. The day will end by exploring the family tree of a well known Scottish author who will be present at the event and give their view of what has been discovered about their ancestors.

The programme is being created to appeal to a diverse group of people, some of whom will have experience of researching family history. It will also be accessible for those who are just starting out on their research and those who might not even have considered that family history is for them. The speakers will be bringing the stories of the past to life. The venue will be open from 8.30am to allow delegates to set up their stands and will continue until 5.30 pm. Refreshments will be available.

• Helen Kay writes: The **Women's International** League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF), the oldest surviving women's peace organisation will be 100 years old in April 2015.

One of the founders was Chrystal Macmillan, an Edinburgh woman who helped organise the first Congress at The Hague in 1915. By 1916, there were three branches in Scotland, Glasgow, Edinburgh and Midlothian - but so far we have not been able to trace the records of their work or their minute books.
